Professional learning can take place in various forms and in various combinations: Professional Development Day, a series of online workshops, mentoring for Hebrew leaders, consultation for school leaders, 1:1 individual coaching, classroom observations and feedback sessions. 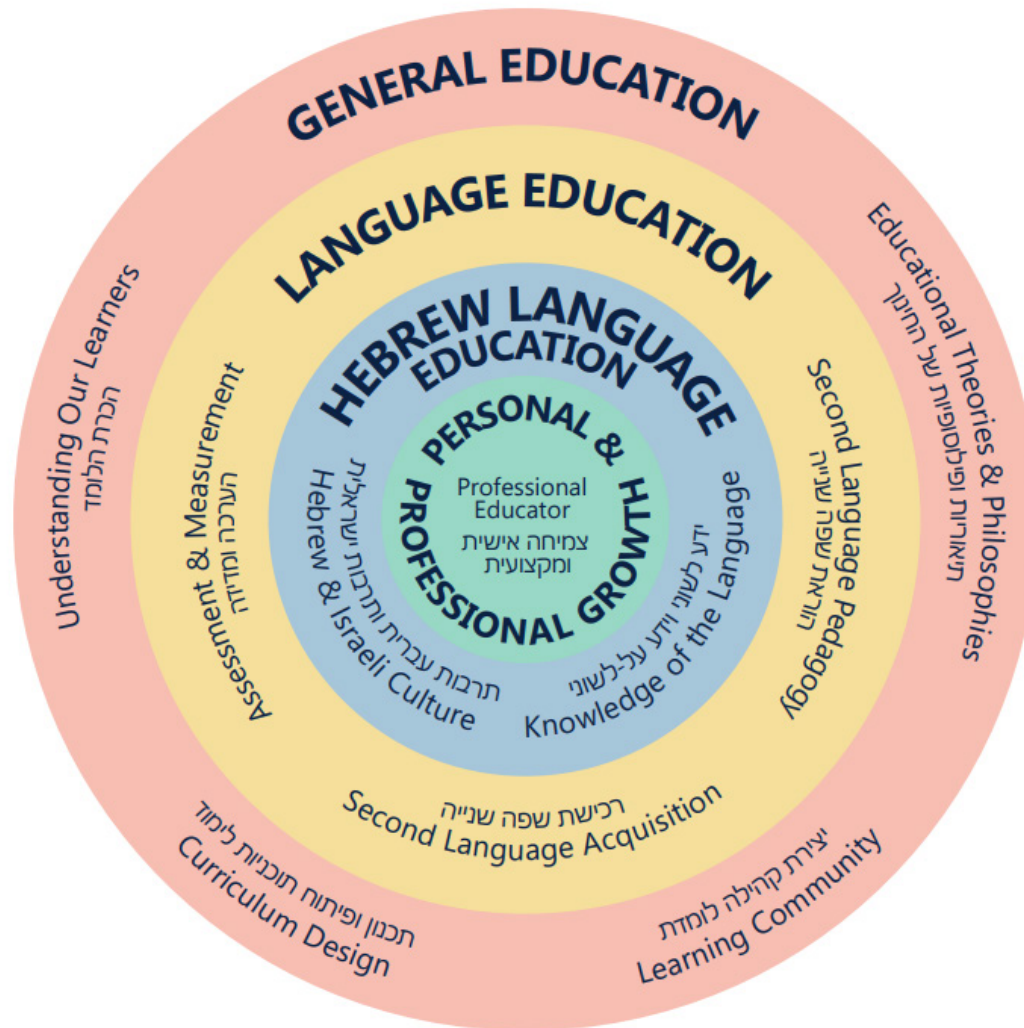

Hebrew at the Center Membership

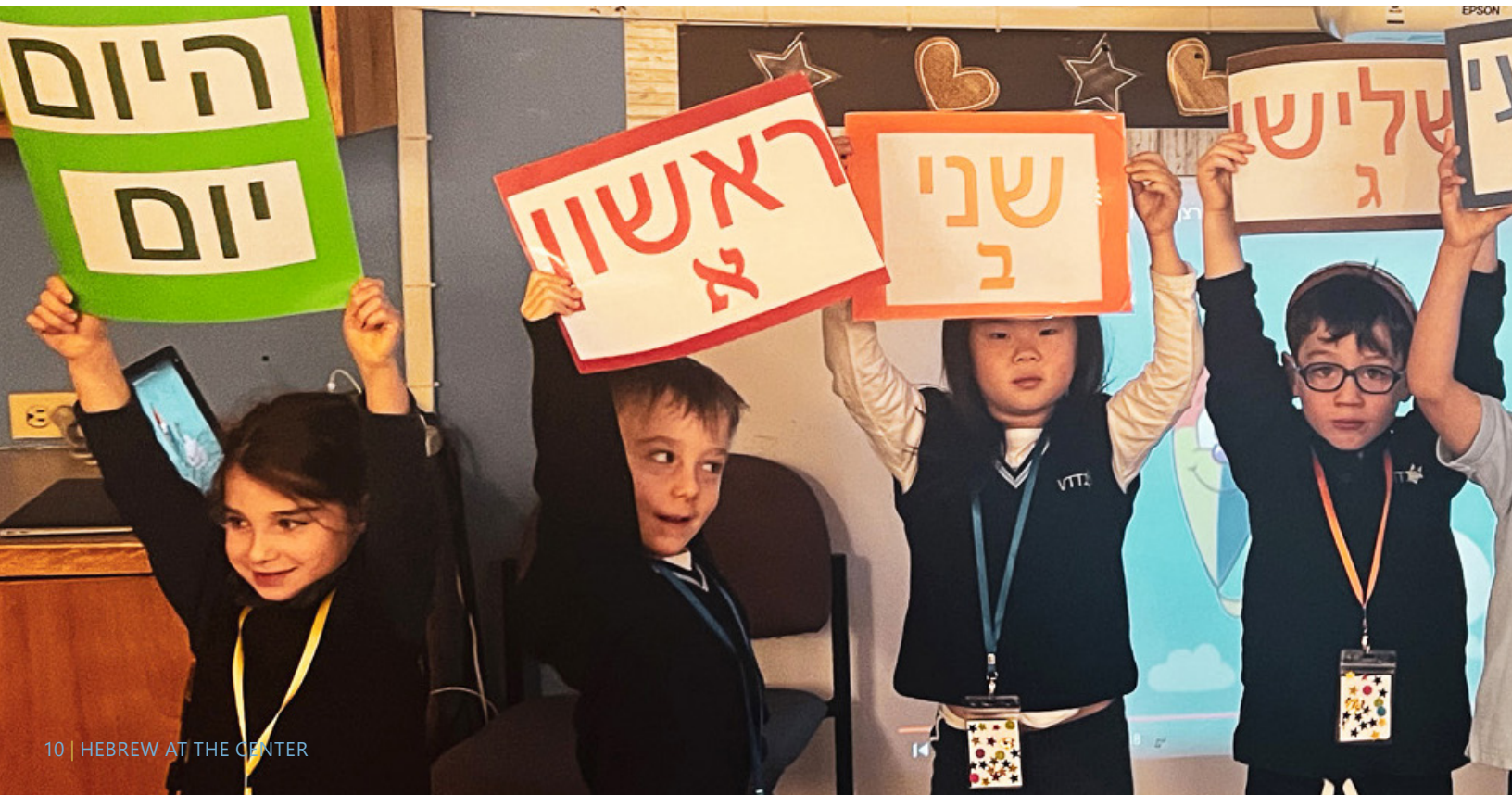

First Year Onsite Visit from One of Our Senior Educators

This is an invaluable opportunity for us to better understand your school and its needs, and to ensure your school is getting the most from your coaching hours. We also aim to deepen the relationship between our consultants and your school leadership to further advance your Hebrew program.

Hebrew and Leadership Coaching

All membership levels include a set number of one-on-one coaching hours. The number of hours depends on the size of the school's Hebrew faculty. You determine the recipients and the content of coaching hours based upon your school's individual needs. Every consultation is unique and may include guidance on conducting a school-wide assessment, including data collection and analysis, interpretation of Avant STAMP results, support in developing presentations and grant proposals, and individual coaching for your Hebrew teachers.



Hebrew Educators Learning Circle

The Hebrew Educators Learning Circle (HELC) is a vibrant community of Hebrew educators and administrators working together to enhance Hebrew teaching and learning. Participants engage with, learn from, and share best practices with colleagues across North America who, like you, are invested in making the study of Hebrew meaningful and inspirational for students everywhere.

Examples of HELC activities include a members-only virtual forum to share best practices and receive notifications about professional learning opportunities, and six virtual member-only discussions throughout the year on timely and relevant topics chosen by you. Topics include strategies for teaching vocabulary, integrating grammar instruction in context, storytelling for early childhood, and more.

Purpose:

Our goals with this visit are to establish a relationship, meet the key educational leadership and Hebrew staff in person and see the elements of Hebrew language learning and other school programming that make your school and the community proud!

Comprehensive School Assessment (Audit)

This is a systematic and thorough review of various aspects of your school's Hebrew program that involves an examination of the school's Hebrew vision and mission, leadership support, instructional methods and practices, curriculum, students' performance and engagement, and staff qualifications, to provide valuable insights for improvement and strategic planning or to secure funding for professional development services. (Can be accompanied by student assessment/s - see page 16)

- Faculty presentation/engagement
- Classroom visits: It is important to see the range of grade levels and groupings with each grade level (if applicable), and to see each teacher at least once for a whole lesson.

Student Assessments

The baseline student assessments listed here assess language proficiency in terms of a speaker's ability to use the language effectively and appropriately in a spontaneous and non-rehearsed context, regardless of when, where, why, or how a speaker has acquired their language. These assessments are not performance tests that assess acquisition of specific aspects of course and curriculum content, nor are they tied to any specific method of instruction.

Hebrew at the Center highly recommends that schools assess each student to establish an accurate baseline picture, allowing for informed decision making regarding the Hebrew program and professional learning focus. Baseline and annual assessment of all students is recommended, though schools may choose to assess specific grades.

Avant Proficiency Assessment (for Grades 3-12)

Avant STAMP stands for Standards-Based Measure of Proficiency and is a web-based test that assesses language proficiency. The test has four sections – reading comprehension, writing, listening, and speaking, and the results of this test inform test takers and educators about learning progress and program effectiveness. For students, this creates opportunities to earn the Global Seal of Biliteracy, AP credits for Hebrew by exam, and recognition of students, teachers, and schools at HESEG. (avantassessment.com)

ELLOPA Proficiency (for JK-Grade 2)

ELLOPA stands for Early Language Listening and Oral Proficiency Assessment and is an Hebrew at the Center developed ELLOPA-based interview tool.

Attitude and Behavior Assessment

This is a survey designed with Rosov Consulting and Hebrew at the Center to examine students' and/or parents' experiences and attitudes toward Hebrew language education at your school.

MaDYK

MaDYK is a universal screening assessment of Hebrew reading fluency skills, that give teachers the ability to simply and easily assess and monitor a child's Hebrew fluency reading level. (madyk.org)

Hebrew at the Center can provide data analysis and preparation of presentation materials for parents and lay leadership.

Pritzat Derech: Hebrew for All

Purpose:

The Pritzat Derech: Hebrew for All initiative focuses on strengthening early Hebrew literacy and supporting access for all learners, including students with language-based learning differences (LBLD). This approach is currently being field-tested in pilot schools. At this stage, Hebrew at the Center offers stand-alone professional learning workshops that share key principles, instructional practices, and insights emerging from this work. These workshops are not tied to a specific curriculum or program. Rather, they are designed to support educators in developing a deeper understanding of Hebrew literacy development and in applying research-based practices within their existing school context.

Pritzat Derech: Hebrew for All workshops may be offered as individual sessions or as part of a series. Each session integrates research, practical tools, and opportunities for application to classroom and school settings. All workshops can be delivered in Hebrew or in English.

Hebrew at the Center highly recommends that schools assess K–3 learners using MaDYK, a universal Hebrew reading fluency screener, in order to establish an accurate baseline of students' decoding and fluency skills. Regular use of MaDYK supports informed instructional decision-making, early identification of challenges, and ongoing progress monitoring within the Hebrew program. Data from MaDYK also informs decisions regarding the focus of professional learning and instructional priorities.

Hebrew at the Center Member Schools interested in conducting MaDYK at their school receive a discount.

Workshops for Educators

Understanding Hebrew Literacy Development:

Workshops in this area examine the structure and development of Hebrew reading, including:

- The components and stages of Hebrew literacy acquisition
- Key similarities and differences between Hebrew and other languages
- Connections between decoding, fluency, and meaning-making

Supporting Diverse Learners

These workshops address common challenges in teaching Hebrew to a range of learners, including those with LBLD:

- Typical questions and challenges in early Hebrew instruction
- Identification of common error patterns in reading
- Strategies and targeted interventions to support student progress

Instructional Practices and Classroom Structures

Workshops focus on effective teaching practices that support all learners:

- Principles of explicit and systematic instruction in Hebrew literacy based on the Science of Reading
- Grouping strategies and station rotation models for differentiated instruction

Curriculum and Program Alignment

These sessions support schools in clarifying and aligning their approach to early Hebrew literacy:

- Articulating expectations for student learning with a focus on early literacy
- Developing or refining scope and sequence with a focus on early literacy
- Integrating listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a coherent framework

Workshops for School Administrators and Student Support Staff: Adapting MTSS for Early Hebrew Literacy

A workshop designed for school leaders, learning specialists, and support service directors that focuses on system-level alignment and structures that enable success for all learners. Applying a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) framework to the context of Hebrew language learning includes:

- Defining Tier 1, 2, and 3 supports in Hebrew literacy
- Aligning screening, instruction, and intervention practices
- Clarifying roles of classroom teachers, specialists, and leadership
- Using data (e.g., MaDYK) to guide decision-making and resource allocation

All workshops can be delivered in Hebrew or in English.
